From the base the students modified their masks to represent their chosen cultural element. The students have used clay, emu feathers, paint, sticks and leaves to construct masks for kangaroos, emus, willy wagtails and goannas to list but a few.

A Reminder:

If students have more than 15% unexplained absences, the Home School Liaison Officer HSLO will contact the students parent/carer.
